2010 TEXAS REUNION DRAWS NIGH: MORE DETAILS ANNOUNCED

Wells Camp Commander Gary Bray has announced that David T. Eschenfelder will be the featured speaker at the Awards Luncheon on Saturday June 5 at the 2010 Texas State SCV Reunion. Eschenfelder was born and raised in Shreveport. His ancestry is a combination of German, French, Scots-Irish, Spanish, and Caddo Indian. Eschenfelder's lineal and collateral ancestors served as volunteers in the French & Indian War, the American Revolution, the War of 1812, the Mexican War, the War of Northern Aggression (both sides), the Indian Wars, the Spanish American War, World War I, World War II, Korea, and Vietnam. He became fascinated with archaeology at age five upon finding his first arrowhead. Eschenfelder's doctoral dissertation concerns Civil War archeology.

Eschenfelder will be bringing approximately 4000 artifacts to put on display. The relics were dug up from the camps of Texas Confederate troops around Mansfield, Louisiana, and this will be the first time they have been displayed anywhere.

Commander Bray will be displaying some of his personal Civil War artifacts, and some United Confederate Veteran camp flags that have recently been turned over to the SCV by the United Daughters of the Confederacy will be on display also.

SCV National Commander Chuck McMichael will be the speaker on Saturday evening.

Vendor registration continues to be strong, with thirteen spaces sold. Civil War related merchandise is **not** a prerequisite for SCV Reunion vendors. Any items that would

be of legitimate interest to our attendees are acceptable. Prospective vendors are encouraged to sign up without delay, as our vendor space is almost sold out. A vendor registration form is attached to the end of this newsletter.

REAGAN'S SAFE ARRIVES IN TEXAS

A safe belonging to the Confederate Postmaster General was delivered by truck to Texas on the morning of May 3. John H. Reagan's office safe arrived at the Rolland Safe Company in north Dallas for several weeks of cleaning and restoration before being put on display at the Confederate Museum in Fort Worth.



John Henninger Reagan (October 8, 1818—March 6, 1905), was a leading 19th century American politician from the state of Texas. A Democrat, Reagan resigned from the U.S. House of Representatives when Texas seceded from the Union to join the Confederacy. He served in the cabinet of Jefferson Davis as Postmaster General. After the Confederate defeat, he called for cooperation with the federal government and thus became unpopular, but returned to public office when his predictions of harsh treatment for resistance were proved correct.

President Davis picked Reagan to head the new Confederate States of America Post-office Department. He was an able administrator, presiding over the only cabinet department that functioned well during the war. Despite the hostilities, the United States Post Office Department continued operations in the Confederacy until June 1, 1861, whereupon the Confederate service took over its functions. Reagan' sent an agent to Washington, D.C., with letters asking the heads of the United States Post Office Department's various bureaus to come work for him. Nearly all did so, bringing copies of their records, contracts, account books, etc. "Reagan in effect had stolen the U.S. Post Office," historian William C. Davis wrote. When President Davis asked his cabinet for the status of their departments, Reagan reported he had his up and running in only six weeks. Davis was amazed.

Reagan cut expenses by eliminating costly and little-used routes and forcing the railroads that carried the mail to reduce their rates. Despite the problems the war caused, his department managed to turn a profit, "the only post office department in American history to pay its own way," wrote William C. Davis. Reagan was the only member of the cabinet to oppose Robert E. Lee's offensive into Pennsylvania in June-July 1863. He instead supported a proposal to detach Longstreet's First Corps of the Army of Northern Virginia to reinforce Joseph E. Johnston in Mississippi so that he could break the Siege of Vicksburg. Historian Shelby Foote noted that, as the only Cabinet member from west of the Mississippi, Reagan

was acutely aware of the consequences of Vicksburg's capture.

When Davis abandoned Richmond on April 2, 1865, before the Army of the Potomac, Reagan accompanied the president on his flight to the Carolinas. On April 27, Davis made him Secretary of the Treasury after George A. Trenholm's resignation, and he served in that capacity until he, Davis, and Texas Governor Francis R. Lubbock were captured near Irwinville, Georgia, on May 10.

Reagan was imprisoned with Confederate Vice President Alexander Stephens at Fort Warren in Boston. On August 11, he wrote an open letter to his fellow Texans urging cooperation with the Union, renunciation of the secession convention, the abolition of slavery, and letting freed slaves vote. He warned of military rule that would enforce these policies if Texans did not voluntarily adopt them. For this, he was denounced by Texans. He was released from prison later that year and returned home to Palestine in December.

On the 29th of May, our camp will be participating once again in the memorial ceremonies at the Decatur-Maxwell-Murphy Cemetery.

The town of Murphy is the home of what once was the largest unmaintained cemetery in Collin County, the Maxwell Cemetery, currently named the Decatur-Maxwell-Murphy Cemetery. Located on the northern edge of Murphy, this cemetery is the final resting place of many of Murphy's earliest settlers, including several Confederate soldiers, with burials dating from 1853 to 1966. The Decatur-Maxwell-Murphy Cemetery contains approximately 3 acres and over 300 graves.

The memorial program starts promptly at 10:00 A.M., and we would like for our troops to get there around nine to help with the setup. If you have a uniform, please wear it. We will probably be firing several salutes, so bring your rifle and powder if you can.
